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Life and Learning at Karanga Mai

This term began with a realignment of our teaching team, as we moved into two rōpū kaiako (teaching teams). This change has allowed us to create a dedicated space for our pēpi, ensuring they have a calm and nurturing environment that supports their early growth and development. At the same time, it has enabled us to design a curriculum more closely focused on our tuākana (older learners), recognising and supporting their unique stages of learning. We deeply value whakaaro and feedback from whānau, as it helps us to continually reflect, review, and strengthen our practice.

He waka eke noa – we are all in this together.

We were excited to welcome a visit from Eco-Educate – 'Rethinking Rubbish'. Our tamariki loved the hands-on experience of sorting items into miniature bins and matching them with the correct coloured trucks. There was lots of great thinking and korero, especially around para kai (food waste). Ka rawe ngā tamariki!

We have also been enjoying opportunities to explore our wider community. This included a trip to the local library, where tamariki were able to connect with new stories and new learning spaces.

This term also marked another intentional step forward on Te Ara Māori- the Māori Pathway. Our kaiako had a second meeting with Lynne and Halle to strengthen our understanding, and we were thrilled to hold a whānau hui as part of this journey together. This fourth term we will step forward together and share our learning plan on our FB groups, Storypark at the ELC and YPC so we can learn together with our mokopuna.
